## Problems 1, 2



The figure shows a non-conducting spherical shell of inner radius R and outer radius 2 R (i.e. radial thickness R ) with charge Q uniformly distributed throughout its volume.

## Problem 22



The figure shows two points, $\mathrm{P}_{1}$ and $\mathrm{P}_{2}$, separated by a distance 3 m in the horizontal direction. There is a plane electromagnetic wave propagating in direction normal to the paper. The magnetic field $B$ from this electromagnetic wave at point $P_{1}$ is shown at time $t_{0}$, pointing up. The frequency of this electromagnetic wave is $f=0.5 \times 10^{8}$ cycles $/ \mathrm{s}(\mathrm{Hz})$ $(\mathrm{f}=\omega / 2 \pi)$. At point $\mathrm{P}_{1}$ there is a positive charge, and at point $\mathrm{P}_{2}$ there is a negative charge, both charges are at rest. The forces on these charges due to the fields of the electromagnetic wave at time $t_{0}$ :
